Community members leading services at NLPJC

On 21st May, three NLPJC members, Claire Helman, Robin Samson and I, led the entire Shabbat Morning Service, "flying solo" for the first time in Rabbi Shulamit's absence. As over the past several months. each of us led one section of the service. With huge support from everyone in the service, the response was really positive. For the past eight months, we have been part of the first cohort of students in the new Liberal Judaism Ba'alei Tefillah programme which trains members of, mainly small. communities to lead services. Primarily a distance learning programme, the modules took us through the history, construction and content of services, deepening our understanding of Liberal Judaism's approach to prayer. With Rabbi Shulamit we learnt both practical skills for leading worship and those of us (like myself) who needed to improve their Hebrew reading did so! At the residential weekend - a transformatory experience for

me, and I think others - we

each gave our first dvar torah!

This course has been an extraordinary and inspiring experience for us all, as was acknowledged at the graduation ceremony at the LJ Day of Celebration on 22 May. Alice Wilcock from Woodford Liberal Synagogue (who has been part of our NLPJC core study group) perfectly summed up this experience in her address, as this edited extract shows:

"When we met at the launch event last October, although nervous, we all shared a common wish to build our expertise as lay leaders, to be able to serve our communities by providing good and prayerful experiences in a way that they and we would enjoy. Since that time we have been on an amazing learning experience. We have all, to various degrees, enjoyed the modules we have studied, and we have certainly enjoyed putting our newfound skills to the test through our practical experiences of leading services. Most importantly we came together to give each

other support, encouragement and challenge. We have become friends and colleagues in a very special and connected way which has powerfully enriched our practice and our learning experience."

Thank you to the leaders, authors and administrator of our course - Rabbis Richard Jacobi and Monique Mayer, Beverly Taylor and Alex Wakely, who made this all happen and worked so hard supporting us. We thank Liberal Judaism, the NLPS

Trust and NLPJC for their support – both with funds and personnel. Most of all, we thank Rabbi Shulamit for sharing her always-inspiring teaching and direction – and you, our community, for your patience (certainly in early days!), your encouragement and your ever-growing enthusiastic participation in services. Our Shabbat morning chanting raises the roof these days!

Alice ended her address with a prayer from Rabbi Eleazar, which I share here with you all:

May it be your will Eternal One, our God, that in our communities there dwell love and support, peace and friendship.

May you make our communities abundant in disciples.

To the very ends of our lives may you endow us with hope and expectation, may you sustain us in our world with good friends and a good impulse. Amen.

We Will Do and We Will Hear

Once in a while I find myself telling someone I have had a life changing experience. This spring I feel it's happened to me twice. I'll write about one of those instances here, and perhaps about the other one in the next edition of the newsletter.

I was lucky enough to take part in a two day introductory training course for members of organisations who have joined the newly founded North London Citizens. It was an extraordinary experience. Challenging and tough at times. But it really made me think, and got me thinking in a way that seemed to be at the same time new, and also in a sort of a language for something I think I have always inherently believed. We have joined a kind of federation of schools, churches, mosques and synagogues, who in coming together will find areas of common concern that affect us as citizens. We will then work together to tackle some of these problems. getting more involved, and having more of an impact in the society around us.

This 'broad based community organising' works through the very simple process of developing relationships, being committed to spend time listening to each other to, first of all, work out what our worries really are. During the two day training we looked at the theory and the practise, and had quite an intensive go at practising negotiation skills. But the

thinking I took away was the centrality of listening.

We began our listening campaign formally this year at Pesach, with every single person, young, medium and old, spending time listening to each other and noting down the things that really worried us.

It was great to make the link between our liberation at Pesach and our commitment to the development of our freedom and the liberty and safety of people we live alongside. We also learned a lot about the things that really matter. How some of us are quite isolated, and the simple things we can do to break down this isolation.

On a personal level, Pesach was the beginning of a journey for me, during the 49 days, leading up to the festival of Shavuot.

This year, at our late night Shavuot study session, we will focus on our lived spiritual experience, through the core idea of how the Israelites accepted the covenant at Sinai. Once Moses had come down from the mountain and read to our ancestors the substance of our covenantal book, the people are said to have answered as one, 'We will do and we will hear'. Centuries of thinkers have wondered at this. How can Doing precede Hearing? Some would say that this is proof that you must fulfil the commandments before you can understand

them. They see this as a sign of a desirable and unquestioning obedience. On Shavuot we will explore this. What is the deeper connection between Doing and Hearing? How can we bring ourselves to the point when we really do listen? And how might listening change us, and our actions? I hope we will move away from a focus on just sitting and thinking, with live music from our own community musicians, food, singing, and learning.

And while I am talking about doing and experience, I wanted to let you know that our first Friday night dinner was a lovely evening and a real success. Totally informal, this is a chance to be together with others on Friday night, with an early start.

We lit candles, recited Kiddush, hung out together, ate, and had an impromptu Sephardi singing workshop from Rebekka. There was a good mix of people, including those who came on their own, with partners and with children. The kids sat together at their own mini table, and entertained themselves.

Our next Friday night is on June the 10^{th} , do come along.

Junior Cheder

Hello to all the Junior Cheder parents, and other members of the community. As we draw to the end of a year studying ritual, I would like to reflect on some of the achievements of the children.

Firstly, the children all showed great enthusiasm for the various activities and many parents are now in the possession of beautiful hand-crafted artefacts associated with the rituals studied, such as Tallit bags, Mezuzot and Tefillin.

Discussions were highly thoughtful, engendering such questions as 'Do you have to believe in God to pray?' (They felt not, on the whole). The 'Ask the Rabbi' book was created and used to record particularly thorny questions that arose.

The class were polite and insightful when interviewing Rabbi Shulamit and the Rev. Lucy Ann regarding comparative rituals, drawing the conclusion that while they have better outfits, we do have better food: a succinct but fair assessment of the difference between Christianity and Judaism.

Their understanding of the concepts of Tzedekah was impressive and the children raised almost £10 for their selected charity, 'The Wood Green Animal Rescue Centre'. Thank you to everyone who donated and we hope you enjoyed the parsley and horseradish.

The children remain very eager to develop their marketing skills and there may be further fundraising opportunities in the future.

Lastly, I have been keen for the children to extend their experience

of service and really feel part of their community and I appreciate the patience shown by all regarding the class coming in and out of service. The interest that the community shows in their learning means a lot to them.

I look forward to working with our children in the coming year.

Cheder Corner The Year in Review

Request to any adults reading this: the Senior Cheder has been asked to decide on and write up a (short!) ritual for some aspect of life where there is no Jewish ritual yet. Suggestions made included the death of a pet, the "retirement" of a teddy or doll, before taking an exam etc. The students were told that the ritual should be no more than 5 minutes, and could include music, poetry, dance, a piece of artwork anything that would make this memorable

It occurred to me that perhaps adults would have some ideas for rituals as well: e.g. for being made redundant, for instance, for giving up an elderly but well loved car (I wrote an obituary when I had to get rid of my first car, I was that sad), for breaking an ancient piece of crockery, before cutting out a pattern to be sewn or, in my case, before starting a piece of knitting. If you have an idea, please let me know, or if you want to write one up - so much the better. The students' rituals are due the first Cheder of June.

This year has been a challenging one for the Cheder. We have had two classes, and for a time we were not exactly sure how we were going to fit everyone in. But it has seemed to work out - the Junior Cheder, under the expert guidance of Rachel Epson, is in the room over the flower room, and the Senior Cheder

meets (quietly!) in the corridor. Both have their drawbacks the Junior Cheder room ideally needs more more lighting (desk lamps maybe?) while the corridor can be open to interruptions from people moving back and forth. However. we have had a good year with respect to our themes.

The Junior Cheder students have shown us some wonderful artwork (If the Shabbat box is

still available, see it. It is lovely. The challah, in particular, is brilliantly done) and have asked the Rabbi some penetrating questions.

The Senior Cheder has had discussions about how Liberal Judaism differs from other forms of Judaism in terms of practice and thought. We have also looked at rituals which are not practiced by Liberal Jews but may be by other Jews, and have discussed why. A baby naming in June will also be conducted mainly by the Senior Cheder.

So far the consensus is that our year has been very fruitful, and we look forward to next year.

In addition we have three candidates for bnei mitzvot, who are meeting after Cheder to discuss the social and personal growth questions in the bnei mitzvot book. If any parent who is

> interested in their child possibly having a bar or bat mitzvah and would like to see it, please ask me. It is for candidates and families to discuss together the changes which might be expected (or might not!) after the bnei mitzvot.

I think we should have an award night for NLPJC. I would call our awards "Miriams" - for the woman who kept our people afloat by finding water during the flight from Egypt. I would give Rabbi Shulamit and Sue Lukes a "Miriam" each, and I do want to thank them for their patience, forbearance and kindness. Ever since I began this post, I have been able to rely on them totally, and I do think all of our members should know how much they give to the Cheder during the year. Julia Chalfen, who so carefully organises the budget, would receive a "Miriam" for dealing with our silly questions, forgotten dates and general incompetence in times of stress. Rachel Epson definitely deserves one for how happy and focussed the Junior
