A Sense of Permanence

I love the summer. Not for the sun, but for the long summer evenings, being outside, the way time itself seems to stretch. Yet even in the middle of this special time, maybe because we live here in England. I'm also aware that soon it will end. Autumn will come, and then the winter. It helps me savour the better weather, knowing as we do that these times can't last. Temporariness feels more special. I feel this too when I go camping, or more accurately perhaps, when it's time to go home. The tent is packed, and all the bags piled up. I look back on the ground where we have slept and see we left no trace. The grass springs back, and we are gone.

Most synagogues have a permanent building, some people even think of the building itself as the very essence of the synagogue. A permanent place can hold onto memories. The squeak of the floor, the smell of the polish, the feel of a wooden rail under the thumb. Hours spent chatting in corners. I don't know if the children growing up in our Kehillah will have memories like these, but I suspect they will, even though we don't own our building. Buildings are great for a sense of permanence, and they are also very convenient.

It's quite hard work setting everything up from scratch. Shifting chairs, tables, even the ark! Moving every piece into place and when the morning is finished, then putting everything back. Setting it right, so it's as though we leave no trace. The funny thing is how we have come to value this sense of a

living community-kehillah- over the buildings, and how the constant task of setting up and taking down continues to value the people who do it. Which is just as well, since this High Holidays there is a challenge ahead. As festival days vary from year to year, this coming Yom Kippur falls on a Wednesday. We cannot hold the day time service at the New Community Rooms, as Wednesday is a drop in for the Hackney Migrant Centre. This incredible service will see around 50 clients, 20 of them new, on that one day, specialist advice, English classes, a midday meal and training sessions for volunteers. This means we will move to our second venue for Yom Kippur day, at Defoe Road. We will need your help. Not just for shifting books and chairs, but more creatively perhaps, to create the space. It's hard to describe, but I think I mean a kind of 'holding space' where anything is possible, praying, thinking, remembering, relaxing. Defoe Road doesn't hold many of our memories (apart from the fantastic annual Seder), so I think we will need to try a bit harder to fill the space, to build the ruach, or energy, for which we are known. Should we pray harder, or sing more loudly? I don't know. But I think your attention to the simple act of being part of that day's community will make a difference.

Back to the community rooms.

Although we've come to see the regular job of setting up and putting away as a communal virtue, the bit I know I dread is handling the ark. That heavy, 'portable' necessary but unbeautiful object, with us since our beginnings, difficult to move and easy

to be bashed by, too shallow for our Torah scrolls, and with a scary wobble. It's going to go. Ten years on. we have now acquired an essential symbol of our on-going seriousness, a beautiful, solid, permanent yet moveable Aron ha-Kodesh, or holy Ark. Our ark is just that bit more authentic, since like the original, it has been constructed to move. Though not guite as flexible as the ark that held the Ten Commandments, a wooden case permanently attached to its poles for carrying, our ark nevertheless, with careful handling, will sally into position as we need it. It takes up permanent residence in the New Community Rooms, so though we are there as welcome guests, our ark shows that we are also part of the fabric, and that this is our home.

This course tackles some of the key controversies we argue about as Jews; some of them are new and some of them date back to near the beginnings of the Jewish people. Each week, we will take a multi-faceted approach to each of the topics, through the lens of history, Jewish thought and skills with Jewish texts. By the end of the course, we will have tackled examples from the Talmud, codes and responses to literature. Course participants will be able to read and discuss these in the original and through translations, and people at all levels of Hebrew and Jewish knowledge are very welcome.

Cheder Corner

Like all good Jews, the older Cheder students have spent our sessions discussing and arguing. We took as our texts the booklets put out by LJ, (and now being reprinted, I believe) all on controversial issues.

The Role of Women: Does LJ affirm the equal status of men and women? (Yes is the answer.) What language might we consider changing to make the liturgy more inclusive? What are the origins of other Jewish groups' separation of men and women? Who are some famous Jewish women who took an active part in their communities? What other possibilities are there for women to reclaim their Jewish heritage? (Rosh Chodesh, anyone?)

Ethical Eating: What does kashrut mean? How do we make sure animals are not being treated cruelly? How do we keep down waste? How do we avoid over packaged food in keeping with the principle of *Bal Tashchit* (Do not destroy – see the Environment below)?

The Environment: Does Judaism have concern for environmental well being in general? How is the responsibility of Jews towards the environment shown in Jewish writing? The phrase *Bal Tashchit* is also useful here – assaults against nature are also assaults against ourselves. How do we guard against these? What is the LJ view of population control? With a list of 23 ways of helping the environment, how many of these do we do?

Some areas took more time than others. Given the gender mix of the group (almost all girls and many weeks, only girls) the issues about women took two sessions.

How to choose clothing without using sweat shop labour was a particularly spirited class. Brought up as the theme of one of the Bnei Mitzvot, the sobering conclusion was that if the girls only used shops that didn't use sweat shop labour, they'd probably only be able to appear in underwear!

We also had four excellent speakers: one on the use of music in detention centres and the problems of immigrants (leading to a discussion of the problems of immigration and the history of Jewish immigration), two from LJY Netzer and one from our own Vicky on the historical differences between Judaism and Christianity.

And then, of course, there were the Bnei Mitzvot... Given that we only meet twice a month, with time out for school holidays and synagogue celebrations, we have had a packed year. I learned a lot from my students, as all good teachers should. And I certainly learned (as if I didn't know before) that our older cheder students are articulate, intelligent, learned, interesting and ethically profound. A teacher's dream.
